



Feedback on Teams



One of the great things about Microsoft Teams is that your teachers can also use it to provide you with feedback to your work. Your teachers will provide feedback for your work in a number of ways, just like they do when you are in school:

Written Feedback



Using Rubric



Verbal Feedback



Praise




Whole-Class



Written Feedback

1. Your teacher cannot provide written feedback for **every** piece of work that you do, so they will also use some of the other methods mentioned above.
2. When they write feedback for you, they will write it in the assignment that you have completed and click 'return' so that you can read it.
3. When your teacher clicks 'return' you may receive a notification in:
 1. Your Activity Page in Teams
 2. Your emails in Outlook (this could be In your clutter box).
However you can check your 'returned' assignments to read feedback at any time you like.
4. To view your feedback click on 'assignments', go to 'completed' and click on the assignment to check for feedback.

6. If your teacher has asked you to improve or add to your work, you can do this by clicking on the assignment and then clicking 'turn in' again so the teacher can review it once more.



Feedback using Rubric

1. Rubric is just another word for a Mark Scheme. You can open a rubric **before you complete a task** so that you can see what the teacher is looking for.
2. Some Rubric will award you points or a Gold/Silver/Bronze standard or look like a GCSE marking Grid.
3. If you have a rubric attached to your feedback. When your teacher returns your work you can open the rubric and you will see one shaded in dark blue. This is the standard your teacher has given you for your work.

Development of design proposal

Excellent 4 points

Imaginative ideas demonstrating a degree of creativity, which are further developed to take account of ongoing research An appropriate design strategy, with evidence of planning, adopted for most aspects

Good 3 points

Design ideas show some degree of creativity and further development An appropriate design strategy, with some evidence of planning, adopted for some aspects

Fair 2 points

Ideas show some variation in approach or concept A limited design strategy, with minimal planning, is evident

Poor 1 points

Ideas are lacking in imagination with minimal development or further research Little evidence of a logical approach being adopted, with no indication of planning



Don't forget that your teacher will be giving you live feedback during Live Lessons.

The more you get involved, the more verbal feedback and praise you will get.
